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

Brenda reminded the tribes of the Faster Families Highway: a technological solution to better engage and track perspective foster parents. All of VA's tribes have the opportunity to create an on-ramp if that is something they are interested in. Please let Brenda or Ivey know if they would like a 1:1 meeting to discuss.



Brenda gave an update on the ICWA training that group helped to create: when last checked in August, we had 206 hits in the new Intro to ICWA eLearning. John noted there were 157 completions of the training. And also, we created trivia videos for local department staff which have been a big hit and a great way to engage and educate staff. Chief Brown indicated that it is important to have state recognized tribes voice into ICWA and training and that Cheroenhaka (Nottoway) has their own child welfare laws.



No slides were show, but Elena Serrano with the Virginia Family Nutrition Program shared about the SNAP-Ed program, which stands for Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program Education. This program focuses on food security, providing culturally appropriate foods, and they have different projects and community partnerships in place. They are currently hiring for a Coordinator of Indigenous Populations. Ivey will send out the job notice to the tribal roundtable leaders. They are interested in hearing about the interests and needs of indigenous populations. Chief Brown noted that in Southampton Co schools, he commended the SNAP program; Claudia gave kudos to Southampton DSS for that collaboration.

What is Thriving Families, Safer Children?

The <u>first-of-its-kind Thriving Families</u>, <u>Safer Children movement</u>, which now includes <u>child welfare sites in 22 states</u>, is supported by Casey Family Programs, Prevent Child Abuse America (PCA America), The Annie E. Casey Foundation, The National Center for Injury Prevention and Control at the <u>Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)</u>, and The U.S. Children's Bureau as an opportunity to create a more just and equitable child and family well-being system.

VDSS is partnering with Families Forward Virginia and seeking RFAs for Family Resource Center Demonstration Sites across Virginia.

For Virginia, this innovative approach will provide resources and support for five to seven selected jurisdictions, localities, and communities that create, build and collaborate with people who have lived experience, other community organizations, civic groups, and non-traditional service providers in the development of a Family Resource Center framework that focuses on advancing primary prevention initiatives. The Family Resource Center framework provides multiple services to both children and families, increases parenting skills and protective factors, and reduces the likelihood of formal involvement with child protective services. This helps stabilize families before a crisis reaches a level requiring CPS intervention or a child's placement in out-of-home care.

Ivey will be sending out the RFA information to all of the tribal leaders.




