

# Singular Goal "North Star"

- In the 2020 Appropriations Act the Virginia General Assembly recognized an
  opportunity to make a bold, unprecedented, and coordinated commitment to prevent
  child abuse and neglect across the Commonwealth; and directed Virginia Department
  of Social Services, in partnership with numerous state agencies and non-governmental
  organizations, to establish a five-year child welfare Prevention Plan.
- The Key Stakeholders are the Department for Behavioral Health & Developmental Services, Department of Health, Department of Education, The Family and Children's Trust Fund, Families Forward Virginia, Voices for Virginia's Children, and Virginia Poverty Law Center.
- The Prevention Plan reflects a collaborative effort among 50 representatives from 29 different organizations, including those representing parent and youth voice.



All families, youth and children in the Commonwealth are safe, healthy and nurtured, and have equitable access to resources and opportunities to thrive in their communities.



# Prevention Plan Objectives



Well-Being and Economic Stability: Families will have easy and equitable access to supports
and services in the community that promote well-being and strengthen economic stability.



Person and Family Centered Programs: Establish and deliver effective, trauma-informed programs that are person and family-centered.



3. Social Norms: Transform social norms to support parents and positive parenting



4. Collaboration: Foster collaboration among those with lived experience, prevention partners and state agencies to better understand needs and work together towards the achievement of common goals



Infrastructure: Establish infrastructure that targets funding and resources for prevention and promotes data sharing and workforce development



- Disentangle poverty from neglect so that we can provide meaningful support to strengthen families, keep children safe and prevent unnecessary entries into foster care



The Project Outcome - Transformation from a reactive child protection system into a proactive child and family wellbeing system that will integrate equitable family supports that reduce disparities in outcomes.

#### **Project Goals**



Design and implement an integrated, cross-system approach to supporting children and families within their communities.



Design and implement an integrated approach to engage individuals with lived expertise (LEx Leaders).



Develop a robust, crosssystem network of collaborative partnerships.



Decide on well-being measures that cut across human services programs.





Evaluate family support systems and the primary prevention activities and strategies implemented.












Brandi went over the CPS referral process briefly



CPS continues to receive large numbers of referrals regarding infants who have died in unsafe sleep environments. Because of this, CPS Guidance was updated to instruct our CPS workforce to provide education around safe sleep practices.

In Section 4.5.6.7.1 of CPS Guidance, workers are required to:

- Assess the sleep environment and sleep practices with all families who
  have infants and children less than two years of age at EVERY home visit
- Share safe sleep information with all families who have infants and children less than two years of age
- Document their assessments of the sleep environment, sleep practices, and that safe sleep information was provided

Because our guidance mandates that safe sleep information be shared with all families with a child under the age of two, we are currently developing a one-page educational flyer on safe sleep that will be shared with the CPS workforce, community partners, and it will also be posted on our public website. GPS Guidance is also available on our public website.

# Child Fatality Data – SFY 2021

- 44% of unfounded investigations were sleeprelated
- 47% of sleep-related fatalities had a safe sleep space present in the home
- 45% of sleep-related fatalities had a substance use factor



CF Data SFY2021. 44% of unfounded investigations were sleep-related. 73 sleep-related fatalities and it was documented there was a safe sleep space present in the home. Trend of parental substance use factor involved with sleep-related fatalities. These numbers look the same over the past 3 years. Would like to see those numbers go down; unsure what the disconnect is b/c there is education/information in the public

# Trends and Prevention Initiatives

Noticing a trend in unsafe sleep deaths where parental substance use is a factor. Again, this could mean that the decedent was born substance-exposed, there was substance use occurring in the home at the time of the fatality, or one of the parents/caregivers had a history of substance use. Safe sleep information is available; unsure what the disconnect as parents still practicing unsafe methods. How to reach people? Want to work w/any community partners interested in partnering as might be more receptive hearing from a community partner vs VDSS. Every region says that safe sleep education is still needed, across the state and country

Kimberly: are baby boxes still be given out? Carley: VDSS is not affiliated w/that program and so we are not

distributing those; unsure why. Brandi: some agencies had programs that provided Pack and Plays; going to be conducting a survey and gathering data to see where there are gaps and where we can share programs in communities, Carley will find out why stopped working w/that program. Kimberly: It might be worth looking at the data to determine if they worked to reduce infant deaths related to unsafe sleep during the years they were used.

- Culturally relevant
- Population specific

  - Vietnamese
  - Substance Use/Harm Reduction



Some organizations not providing comprehensive DV services but culturally relevant services that is population specific. VDSS is providing funding to these organizations for limited DV services

# **Tribal Opportunities**

- State level conversations about tribal services and community/statewide needs
- Participation in State Planning
- Building knowledge
- Engagement with state agencies
- Funding (direct or pass-through)



Currently no services that are specific to tribal communities; invite the opportunity for DV services that are tribal-specific. Enter into state-level conversations. Talk about tribal community needs; statewide need. VDSS is about to start strategic planning and would like to engage tribes in this process


# Funding

## **FVPSA & VAWA & VOCA**

- Family Violence Prevention and Services Act
  - Direct funding for Tribes through US Dept of Health and Human Services
  - Sub-recipient FVPSA funding through VDSS
- Violence Against Women Act
  - Direct funding for Tribes through US Dept of Justice
  - Sub-recipient VAWA funding through DCJS
- Victims of Crime Act
  - Direct funding for Tribes through US Dept of Justice
  - Sub-recipient VAWA funding through DCJS



Look at funding possibilities: 3 different funding streams, FVPSA, VAWA, and VOCA



DV and SV conversations – Nancy invites tribal leaders to spend time talking about services and how local services can be improved to be more relevant and culturally humble in provision of services to tribal communities – will be sending out an invitation to these meetings with VDSS, DCJS and Virginia Sexual and Domestic Violence Action Alliance. Brenda: is there data collected re: demographics re: survivors who have affiliation with tribal communities? Kimberly: The Youth Risk Behavior Survey may have some. Nancy: demographic information might not be collected properly for those

limited people who provide that information. Part of what Nancy would like to impact. Maybe a way to change how we collect information and would like to have those experts provide that input

Kimberly: Youth Risk Behavior Survey – re: sexual violence, break out by population (for youth); trending in the wrong direction; some children not going to school b/c of safety concerns

Lindsey: I think Nancy is absolutely correct in regard to misclassification. That is a constant problem. Having culturally appropriate materials regarding DV/SA would be very beneficial.

Nancy: if an invitation was sent to all of the tribes, do you think there would be positive reception in creating an opportunity to talk more about what would be helpful in creating DV/SV services? Lindsey said there would be. Natives don't often see materials specific to us with faces that look like us. Maybe more folks would speak up if they see those resources. =
