



## Top-Ten Ranking Virginia Hospitals Recognized for Stellar Paternity Establishment Rates

**Richmond, VA (September 7, 2021)** – The [Virginia Paternity Establishment Program](#) (VPEP), a program which offers unmarried parents the opportunity to establish paternity for newborn children, recognizes the top-ten ranking Virginia hospitals for paternity establishment rates.

VPEP offers unmarried parents the opportunity to establish paternity of their newborns by voluntarily acknowledging fatherhood during their hospital stay. VPEP also supports paternity establishment should unmarried parents decide later that they would like to add the father to the birth certificate. The Commonwealth has a total of 57 hospitals serving parents statewide that assist with paternity establishment.

“Despite the visitation challenges that COVID-19 has presented, hospitals within the Commonwealth continue to demonstrate outstanding efforts to establish paternity at the time of birth,” said Brionna Jones, VPEP project manager. “Establishing paternity not only affirms a father’s legal rights and responsibility, but it also ensures the child has greater access to emotional support and other social and economic opportunities.”

Under COVID-19 restrictions, hospitals within the Commonwealth have limited the number of visitors for new mothers. At some hospitals, this has made it more difficult to establish paternity.

In 2020, more than 33,000 births in Virginia were to unmarried parents. The Commonwealth’s 2020 paternity establishment rate average is 73.64%, similar to 2019’s 73.68%. The hospital with the highest paternity establishment rate is Stone Springs Hospital in Dulles, Virginia, with a 2020 paternity establishment rate of 83.16%. The state mandated requirement is 80%.

The chart below highlights the 2020 hospital ranking determined by the total number of unmarried births:
